Course Title: The Rise of the Modern Western World (Spring Semester)

Course Description: The course begins with a brief survey of the foundations of modern Western Civilization. The rise of individualism, humanism and science, the growth of the state, the emergence of the middle class, the conflict between Protestantism and Catholicism, and the beginnings of the age of liberal revolutions are discussed as ingredients in the birth of the modern world. Next, the historical forces and events that shaped the world in the 19th, 20th, and 21st centuries are reviewed and prospects for the future are postulated.
