Video/Privacy Policy

The School is aware of the importance of protecting the privacy of its members.

When in 2009 we acquired a high-definition video camera and began instructing teachers and students in its use, we initiated procedures to inform members of the possible use of cameras and recording devices in classes and at school events. When students enroll, they are now asked to sign a standard release form that, we hope, will alert students to our efforts to document our activities and build a film archive that might serve in promoting our institution and give them a chance to participate.

Not all students wish to be filmed and it is their right to decline to be filmed, photographed, or recorded without their written consent. to record school without their written consent.

Before filming any school activity, we must assure that all participants have consciously and willingly signed our release form and that instructors have given their oral consent for filming and recording a particular class or event at a particular time.

Moreover, it will be the responsibility of individuals 0748) doing the actual filming to inform those who are

being filmed that they are about to be on-camera. Any request not to be filmed will be honored on-the -spot. Furthermore, we will honor the request of any student or instructor who feels, after being filmed, that the contents of the film may be embarrassing to themselves or others, to delete the relevant portions of the film in question.

In the course of filming school activities, we want participants in those activities to act naturally and to be confident that they will not lose control of audiovisual materials that document their participation in school activities.

At present, Jon Newsom is the principal instructor in the use of the school's video camera. Any student wishing to use the camera to record school activities may do so with his approval. However, it is important that prospective users of the camera (or any other devices that may be used to record school events) notify him each time before classroom recording begins. Field Birding Class Takes a Cruise

The OLLI Field Birding Class field trip on October 3rd was on Cape Water Taxi's boat the Mummichog, with Captain Dave and Captain Ryan. We boarded at Fisherman's wharf in Lewes and slowly cruised up the canal to Roosevelt Inlet, and then went on up the Broadkill River to where Oyster Rocks Road meets the river and Prime Hook NWR begins. Raptors

> were the highlight of the trip, with an adult Bald Eagle flying across the river right in front of our boat early on. Other raptors included several close Osprey, a perched and later hunting Red-tailed Hawk, a distant Northern Harrier, an American Kestrel, and a perched Peregrine Falcon that everyone saw with binoculars, and most people even got to view it through a spotting scope. Other birding highlights were about 6 Belted Kingfishers, probably a dozen or more Great Blue Herons, some quite close, a couple of distant Caspian Terns, and two Seaside Sparrows. A marsh plant

called Salicornia was in full fall colors of a rich red, and High Tide bushes with their soft white flowers were in bloom along the banks. Our Visit to the Barnes Art Museum

Remember the theme from the old TV show Gilligan's Island - "Just sit right back and you'll hear the hospital and were glad to find that our missing a tale, a tale of a fateful trip ... five passengers set sail that day for a three hour tour, ..." Well, now read a tale of 45 passengers who set out at 8:30 am on September 28th in a JorLin bus for a trip to Philadelphia to tour the art collection at The Barnes

Foundation. (No! we did NOT get stranded on a deserted island).

Between 1912 and 1951, Albert C. Barnes assembled one of the world's most important holdings of post-impressionist and early modern art, acquiring works by avant-garde European and American artists. Barnes continually

experimented with the display of his collection, arranging and rearranging the works in ensembles. In 1922 he established his foundation to showcase his large collection of post-impressionist and early modern paintings, African and Asian sculpture, Pennsylvania German furniture, wrought iron objects and other objects and to develop an educational program that would stimulate discussion of aesthetics and art criticism. The number and quality of the pieces is truly staggering and we all left the museum with "Renoir overload" (there are over 180 paintings and objects by Renoir displayed).

Promptly at 3pm we boarded the bus for Lewes. A count of passengers found one missing. After a search of the museum and unanswered phone calls, we were told that someone had been taken to Hahnemann Hospital by ambulance after collapsing


