## From the Chair



Can you believe that we are already more than halfway through the semester? The weather has been delightful- at least around here. So much suffering caused in all sorts of ways this fallhurricanes shootings, wildfires. I'm sure we all keep those affected in our thoughts.

Our unseasonable weather gifted us with a beautiful day for the picnic. Salty Brine will provide you with a full report later in this

issue. Lynn and Jay took lots of pictures that will bring back happy memories. Thanks to Connie Benko who organized it and to her many helpers.

We have an enrolment of 563 this semester, slightly below last fall's 570. That is still a lot of people. Last fall in this space, I urged you to wear your name tags, it's really important to be able to call a person by name, even if we don't know him or her. I have noticed a distinct improvement, but I have also noticed that about half the name tags attached to lanyards are blank side out. I have fussed with mine for years-sometimes getting it right and often not. I have taken to wearing shirts with pockets, V neck sweaters, etc. so that I can simply clip it on. I have had an epiphany about dealing with this! Let's print our names on both sides of the card.

Anna has been promoted. "YAY, Anna!" She is now responsible for the Dover program as well as Lewes/Ocean View. This stretches her pretty thin, but we have hired additional part-time staff here and in Dover. Combining responsibility in this way has enabled Anna to find ways to create efficiencies by standardizing semester dates, fees and registration procedures. The goal is to save money on the very expensive catalog publication process -more than \$2.00 a copy- by combining the Dover and Lewes programs in a single catalog. Another benefit of this is to allow us all to see what courses are being offered. Did you know that, when the priority registration process is complete, any of us can take any course still available at any of the Delaware OLLI locations?



To have achieved this much commonality, Dover has adjusted its fees and semester structure. The one area of difference that remains is in class length. Dover and Wilmington have 75 minute classes. Ours are 90 minutes. Anna proposed, I think

at the August Council meeting, that we adopt the 75 minutes. I thought this was a great idea. The school day would end earlier and the class length was more in keeping with my own attention span. Some of the council members, who are instructors, expressed various misgivings about it so we agreed to mention it at the upcoming faculty orientations. Anna was taking her daughter to Boston to begin her college career. It fell to me to pitch it. Did I get an earful?! I told them to email Anna. And hear from them she did. Well, we don't pay the instructors or even buy them lunch. Without the faculty we would have no program. So we decided to listen to them. **Class lengths will not change.**



provided the perfect end to a perfect evening on the water.







#### In Remembrance of ......



Nancy Newlands Shobe, 83, passed away Wednesday morning, Sept. 27, 2017, at her home in Lewes, with her husband David at her side. Nancy was born in San Francisco, California.

Nancy spent the war years at several Catholic girls' schools in the Washington area, returning with her mother to New York to complete her secondary education. Nancy began

her college career as music major at Wells College, but her father's early death at age 52 caused her to change colleges to Adelphi and her major to early childhood education. That would lead her to a teaching position at Barney Neighborhood House in Southwest Washington, D.C. She met her husband, David, a young Foreign Service officer, in D.C. and traveled with him and their firstborn son to the Philippines, where their second son was born. The couple then went to Rome and Baghdad, after which they returned to the U.S. There, her third child arrived to complete their family.

Moving to Annapolis, Md., to follow her

husband's work in Washington, she turned their Victorian home into a bed and breakfast; an entrepreneurial test which she passed with flying colors. She also continued to give piano recitals at her home, which she had begun doing in New York. She was trained as a classical pianist at the Mannes School of Music in New York.

After moving to Baltimore, Md., she served as a member of the marketing team at Center Stage and the Baltimore Symphony. She also managed a retail store on North Charles Street, People United, an experience which she would put to work at Puzzles and Lewes Gourmet when the Shobes retired to Delaware in 1999.

Nancy was very active as a volunteer and student at the Southern Delaware Academy for Lifelong Learning in Lewes, (now Osher Lifelong Learning, OLLI) in theater, the arts, the film festival, house tours, and Coastal Concerts.

Nancy leaves behind her loving husband, David, three children and one granddaughter.

A Memorial Service was held Sunday, Oct. 8, at Parsell Funeral Homes in Lewes.
