

36 Courses Offered for Summer Session

Spring semester registrations reflected robust enthusiasm for the sixty - - count 'em, sixty - - classes held at the Lewes and Bethany sites and various off-site locations. In addition, each of the four Guest Lecture dates, held at the Rehoboth Convention Center, was sold out and received rave reviews.

Our special thanks to all of the volunteer instructors, whose dedication is the heart and soul of our lifelong learning experience. You are our greatest asset. Certainly there are many others among our membership whose background would similarly provide fascinating subject matter for future classes. We strongly encourage all of you to give it a go. Don't be bashful.

We now look forward to a full roster of thirty-six courses during the four-week summer session, beginning June 3. Subjects will cover the full panoply of disciplines from art to science. For example, this would be a great opportunity to get started on learning Italian in a fun course with Annie Gilmour, or to expand your computer skills, with five different members having stepped up to offer a variety of computer classes.

Twenty of the thirty-six summer classes will be brand new. Among them will be several histories, including Delaware and Sussex County; the lives of Charlemagne and Montaigne; "Ancient Greek Tragic Drama: Antigone" with Bill Zak; and two sessions on the question, "America in Cultural Decline?" with Mary Boyd.

These are but a few of the subjects available in the June term. Any members whose summer vacation plans may preclude their attending a full four-week curriculum should especially consider any of a number of classes that are scheduled for either a single session or two sessions. For example, Michelle and Wes Rumble will share with us the unique story of "A Delaware Woman's Experiences of World War II" in a one-morning time slot; and James Morrison will lead us through both an "Observation of the 1769 Transit of Venus in Lewes" and "The Astrolabe" in separate one-day classes.

Hope to see many, many of you in these classes. And potential new instructors, please give a call to anyone on the Council or the OSHER office with any questions you may have about getting started. Anyone who has taught a lifelong learning class will tell you it is a marvelously rewarding experience.

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
