FREE TO ACADEMY MEMBERS UD ON-LINE DATABASES AND WI-FI ACCESS AT ARSHT

Are you considering registering for a spring 2007 class such as Genealogy or World Wide Web where you are urged to have a UDelNetID and password? If so, now is the time to request them (fill out a form in the Academy reception desk and place it in the AV mailbox). Once your UdelNetID is activated, you can access UD databases from home such as LexisNexis or ancestry.com.

If you have a wireless laptop, you can gain access to the Web (Wi-Fi) at Arsht after registering your computer using your ID and password. A benefit of Wi-Fi is to open up space in most computer classes when all Academy PCs are in use. Between classes you can view your email, follow your stocks, buy a book, place a bid on eBay, etc.

FALL PERFORMING ARTS BUS TRIPS

ARSHT AT 15


