Brief background material on all the nominees will be publicized in mid-February.

If there are no nominees other than the slate proposed by the Nominating Committee, that slate will be presented to the Council for election by affirmation at its March meeting. If additional nominations are made from the membership-at-large, an election by Academy members will be held in March. Whether affirmed at the March meeting or elected by ballot, five new members will assume their seats at the Council meeting in April.




March 7 Casinos in Wilmington


