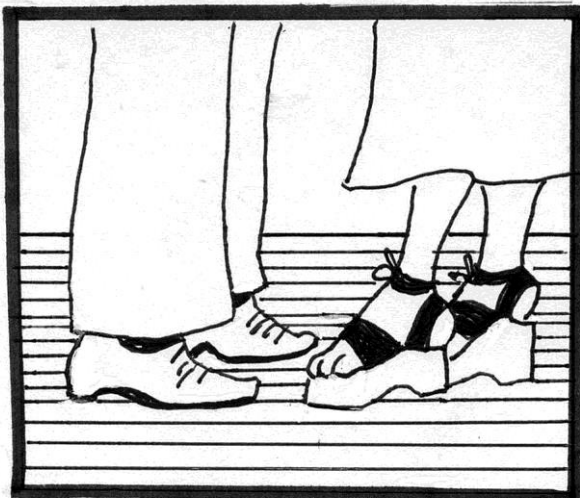
CONSTABLE'S NOTES

COMMON COURTESIES

As the first weeks of classes wind down, it's time to gently remind everyone of a few common courtesies that all Osher Lifelong Learning members need to remember. The first concerns cell phone usage. It's disturbing to instructors and class members when a cell phone goes off during class; more annoying is when the cell phone owner has a conversation with the person calling. We really don't care what you're having for dinner. If you're expecting an important call, put your phone on vibrate and sit near the door. If you don't know how to turn off the ringer, ask someone!

A second issue concerns disruption from members leaving class early. Remember that all instructors are volunteers and paying members who devote effort and time to prepare for class. Instructors are not paid for doing this, but rely on the attention and interest of class members to keep them motivated. It is especially upsetting when guest speakers are interrupted by members exiting the room. Guest lecturers give up their time to come and speak to us without compensation. If you know you must leave before the end of class, inform the instructor, sit close to the door and exit quietly.

The issue of name tags comes up every year. EVERYONE should wear his or her current nametag. There are several reasons for this: so that others know who you are; so that we may readily identify you in a medical emergency; and so that we know that everyone who is there is a lifelong learning member. Believe it or not, some people attend and when asked about their name tags, they say that they "left it at home". We do have scholarship monies available for those who need assistance so that they may attend Osher Lifelong Learning. This is why you are issued a parking tag, and that the UD Public Safety officer checks our lots. People outside of OSHER try to use our lot as a convenient "park and ride" to get into Wilmington.

The last issue concerns attendance and class size. Many of our rooms are small with a set number of available seats. Many of our classes are discussions, and instructors limit class numbers in order to facilitate discussion.

Our instructors prepare enough handouts for the registered members in their classes. There is great disappointment when people are put on wait-lists. It becomes frustrating to instructors and scheduled class members when people decide to just walk in and take a seat. That's why staff and volunteers take roll in some classes. We are limited by the size and number of rooms, and the number of courses that can be offered at specific times during the day.

Please be courteous and follow these guidelines to ensure that Osher Lifelong Learning at UD continues to thrive!!

OLLI AT THE OCEAN

OLLI at the Ocean is an OLLI sponsored intellectually stimulating activity for members, a spouse or a friend. It takes place each year in the week following Memorial Day at the Brighton Suites in Rehoboth, one block from the boardwalk and one block from Rehoboth's main street. All suites are two rooms: living room with TV, sleeping couch, refrigerator, microwave, etc; a separate bedroom with king or two double beds, TV and a bathroom. The hotel has a conference room for lectures, meals and cocktail/social hours.

The program provides eight lecture with topics ranging from serious discussions on science, finance, history, art and medical innovations to musical entertainment. Dinners and breakfast are provided at Brighton Suites. Lunch time provides opportunity to visit the many fine eateries in Rehoboth. Ample free time is available to walk the boardwalk, sun on the beach, visit the outlets or just hang out.

Last summer's program was a great success with 113 attendees. The program included talks on the Middle East, Jerome Kern and his Music, Meet the First Ladies, Women Who Spied, U S Economy, an Evening of Music, Global Warming and a ride on the Kalmar Nyckel.

The lectures provide background information on the operas, the composers, the performers and the lavish productions. They are free and open to the public on selected Fridays at 12:30 p.m. in Room 124.

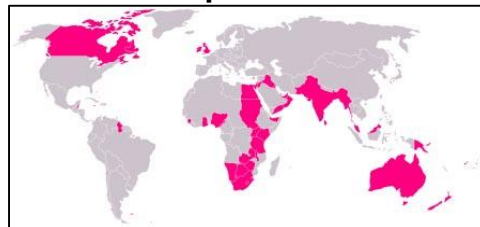
