ALONG THE TRACKS 2018-5

If you have written a story you will know what I am talking about. You struggle for a while to find a topic and then you must come up with a first sentence that will keep your reader reading. As you go along you may barely notice that the story starts to tell itself and you are but the vehicle that puts the words on paper. This story starts with a walk through my mind along the Loockerman Street of the 1950's. There were no malls or even strip malls in Dover. Everything was downtown. Even the Acme Market and the A&P Store were downtown. The Acme did move from its longtime location across from Harry Louie's dry cleaning establishment (the building is now an auto parts store) out to the corner of Route 13 and North Little Creek Road. The Edgehill Shopping Center sprang from that. I suppose it could be called a strip mall.

Back then as it is now Loockerman Street was just two long blocks with some commercial spillover onto State, Bradford, and Governors. There was a sporting goods store next to the Firestone Tire and appliance store. The men hung out in Maag's Sporting Goods. We boys were fascinated by the guns and fishing gear that they sold. In the front of the store they had a rack of magazines for sale. The Playboy magazine was displayed with the best part of its cover blocked. One or two of us would try to divert the view or attention of the clerk behind the counter in order to allow another boy to *read the articles*. There were two furniture stores. There was a Western Auto and a hardware store, three shoe stores, two men's and three women's clothing stores, and four five and dime stores. Believe it or not J. C. Penney and Sears also found room on the same block. We even had two or three jewelry stores downtown.

There were four stores that were called drug stores, Clarke and McDaniel's, Sun Ray, Silco, and Bryan's Rexall Drug Store. These so called drug stores and a chat with Margaret Bryan were the genesis for this story. I am not even sure that all the stores had pharmacy counters. Sun Ray and Rexall had lunch counters. When I had a paper route with the Delaware State News which was located on North Street at the time the Rexall was a day stop on my way from school to the paper. Fortified by a soda fountain cherry coke and a bag of Bar-B-Q potato chips I was set for my afternoon job. I was talking to Margaret Bryan at the OLLI open house. Margaret is very active in the Wyoming Methodist Church. This day she was working on the upcoming yard sale. The last time I saw her was at their book sale. Not long after talking to her I saw her husband, Terry. Terry is a dentist who had a mobile dentistry practice that travels to serve people who can't get out easily. Terry also teaches some classes at OLLI.

Terry's father, the man all of Dover knew as Doc Bryan was the owner and pharmacist of the Rexall Drug Store. Doc Bryan was a brilliant man, but I think my mother always liked that inside he was a country boy with connections to Love Creek near Millsboro, her childhood home.

Funny isn't it? I send my mind for a walk down the Loockerman Street of my youth and pick up a thread here and one there. They weave their way along and pick up a guy from the class behind me in school who teaches at OLLI, a school I now attend, and his wife volunteers at the church where the OLLI Program holds classes. If the fabric of life is woven this must be how it is done.


